Hidden in the corners of our cities and behind unseen eyes is a poverty of loneliness, which reaches its tragic peak in a demographic that often goes unnoticed... **the homeless.**

We can easily see material poverty, the need for housing, food, and employment. But at the root of this problem runs a deep poverty of loneliness: the need for friendship, support, and human connection.

Often without jobs, family, or other social spheres, the homeless are among the most vulnerable to depression and despair. In our midst are the poorest of the poor, not only materially, but socially as well.

But there is hope

The cycle of poverty can be broken by the simple strength of human connection.

Imagine if every city had, not only soup kitchens and shelters, but people who were there just to help the homeless know they have a home in us.

And what is home but a small taste of Christ's infinite love? And what is love but being fully seen, known, and valued?

HOW IT WORKS



At Christ in the City, we understand that the root of homelessness is

ruptured relationships


Therefore, a relational approach for homeless ministry is needed.



Young adult's volunteer to be **missionaries** for 1-2 years. They live, pray, and serve together and invite the local community to join them in meeting the homeless with friendship.



They attend daily Mass and receive **formation** to deepen their Catholic faith.



Missionaries walk the same routes in the city **all year long** with no agenda other than to bring the love of Christ and restore the human connection that is so desperately needed.




This catches many of the homeless off-guard at first because they are living in survival mode, constantly alert for potential threats. But in time,

trust is built.



It begins by **asking the person's name** and remembering it next time we see them.



We approach people with a willingness to listen

and to be ourselves - seeing a person to be loved, not a problem to be "fixed".



It's the **relationship** that opens the door. That human connection is the catalyst for our homeless friends to take advantage of housing, sobriety programs, and job opportunities; To overcome the depression and loneliness that is often so paralyzing.



As our friends recognize that they are worthy of being loved and capable of maintaining relationships, they often begin to reconnect with family, and start a **journey** of healing that changes the

CHRIST IN THE CITY CHANGES HEARTS BY TEACHING US HOW TO GAZE"

I always say that I met Jesus in college, but I fell in love with Him during the time I served at Christ in the City. Walking through the doors on my first day, I had no idea what to expect. I couldn't have possibly imagined to be met with such tenderness, joy, and compassion.

The staff and missionaries held up a mirror for me to see both my strengths and my weaknesses in a way that was so encouraging and gentle.

I, of course, encountered Jesus in our friends on the streets. I saw my littleness reflected in their strength. I often saw my disposition to the Lord reflected in their responses to me.

As transformative as these encounters are, I have found it difficult to articulate exactly what the Father did for me during my summer at Christ in the City. During a conversation about your mission with my friend Rachel, who led a FOCUS mission trip to Christ in the City in March, she phrased it well. She said, "I've watched a lot of people gaze at the Lord in adoration. Watching the CIC missionaries gaze at Him was particularly beautiful, because I knew when they turned away from Him to look at me their gaze didn't change."


This is how Christ in the City changes hearts, by teaching us how to gaze. First at the Lord, then at each other. **With no distinction between the rich and the poor**, material or otherwise. When you learn to gaze, you also learn how to be gazed at. How to sit humbly in the gaze of another, and of the Lord.


