## YOUNG ADULTS COME FROM ACROSS THE COUNTRY

Missionaries live in a common house. They spend intentional time praying, serving the poor, and sharing meals together in order to grow in virtue, love, and likeness to Christ.

Theology classes and nonprofit internship experience help these young adults to form a Catholic worldview and mature as Christian leaders.

Throughout the year, missionaries receive one-on-one accompaniment by spiritual mentors dedicated to their growth and well-being.

#### MISSIONARIES PUT FAITH IN ACTION IN SERVICE TO THE POOR

Missionaries walk regular street routes to encounter the homeless. They spend time learning people's names and stories and return day after day. Over time, these encounters lead to genuine friendships and trust is built.

Whether it's bringing a birthday cake to a homeless friend or walking them to the hospital, this consistent presence tells the homeless: "I see you. You are loved. You matter." A renewed sense of hope arises when our homeless friends understand that someone truly cares about them. This hope can be the inspiration for them to pursue healing, freedom, and life in community.

With general knowledge of the local resources, missionaries are able to walk with the homeless when they are ready to take the next steps. This friendship helps uphold the person through the burdens of the journey.

## CELEBRATING 10 YEARS Addressing Poverty at its Core



St. JPII gathers one million youth in Denver for World Youth Day. The Holy Spirit lights a fire in Denver and lays the foundation for many new apostolates to be founded in the following years, renewing the life of the Church in the US. Over the last decade, the Lord has inspired Christ in the City to bring His healing Love to the poor, and at the same time, to form young people to be missionaries in today's world.

Guided by the Holy Spirit, we've sat with homeless men and women on street corners, in parks, at the library, and local shelters. We've accompanied friends through their suffering, whether it's simply providing a listening ear or taking them to the hospital after a frostbitten night. We've supported friends through weeks of sobriety and walked with others through periods of relapse. We've helped reconnect individuals back with their family and for others, we've been their only semblance of family.

In these past 10 years, we've moved houses, formed hundreds of missionaries, and expanded to new cities, but the core of the mission has remained the same. It has always been centered on showing each person that they matter, and there is hope in Jesus Christ. We've seen time and time again that the path to healing goes far beyond just getting a house, it happens through healthy relationships with other people.

In this way, Christ in the City is addressing poverty at its core by inviting the homeless into a community where they are seen, known, and loved. This makes all the difference. As we form real friendships with the homeless, we find ourselves drawn deeper into our own poverty. Along the way, Christ continues to affirm our own identity and need to completely rely on Him. We are grateful for Christ in the City's first 10 years of ministry and we look forward to the decades to come!

## On the streets DURING COVID-19

The streets were empty.

The visible loneliness on the faces of the homeless was more striking than ever.

Parks, food lines, libraries and many resources for the homeless were closed.

Homelessness increased rapidly. Nearly 700 tents popped up across Denver.

## Christ in the City was named an essential service to continue serving the homeless.

We adapted our ministry to deliver hot meals in to-go boxes and continue to make regular visits to our homeless friends.

I spent this past year serving with Christ in the City. Daily, we went out and walked the same street downtown with a goal to form authentic friendships with men and women experiencing homelessness, while providing whatever material and emotional aid we could.

I quickly learned that the material poverty I saw on the streets is most often coupled with a deeper, internal poverty of intense isolation and loneliness.

Since COVID-19, it's been interesting to see how a lot of the world has also taken on this sense of fear and isolation that I have been seeing on the streets all year long. Though most people's lives have changed overnight, the homeless' lives have not had the privilege of changing. Resources for the homeless are scarcer than before so we have been continuing our service as safely as possible. Early on in the pandemic, one of our homeless friends said to us,

## "Thank you for not being afraid of serving us."

I don't think any of us can shy away from serving each other at this time: whether that is by volunteering, donating to a local food bank, or calling to check in on friends.
