
# 67 Seminarians from around the country experienced mission trips this past year!

"I appreciate many things Christ in the City does for my seminarians. It brings them face to face with the many complications and realities of people struggling on the street. While maintaining an awareness of safety, the seminarians meet people on their terms: in the streets, along the river, out in the open. This requires of the seminarians a greater vulnerability and humility since they are not acting from the safety of a known environment. It teaches them HOW to go out. But most of all, it teaches them to look at the person, not just the problem; to seek to love, not just to fix."

#### Friendship Bezond Words


"During my first year, I was assigned to the Parks route, known for its Hispanic community, particularly a corner where older Latino men often gathered. One man, Oscar, stood out to me. Originally from Mexico and in his 60s, Oscar barely spoke English, and I barely knew any Spanish beyond the basics. *At first, I saw this language barrier as an obstacle to building a relationship.* Fortunately, the other missionaries on the route spoke Spanish and helped me understand.


Despite our limited ability to converse, Oscar and I formed a meaningful bond. Over time, he became less of a friend and more like a grandfather to me, even giving me the nickname 'Gabby,' something that felt endearing and special.

Oscar's reaction to our visits changed throughout the year—he seemed happier to see us as time passed. A mutual friend, Julio, once thanked us for befriending Oscar, saying he had noticed a positive change in him. Oscar was taking better care of himself and avoiding bad habits more often. While my team and I can't take credit for his transformation, it was a blessing to hear that our friendship played a small role in it.

One moment that revealed the depth of our connection happened at a 'Lunch in the Park'. Oscar spotted me from across the park, called out 'Gabby!' with a big smile. In that moment, I realized how much our love and care for one another had grown, even without many words. He may not have had a home, but he loved me like a granddaughter, and seeing his heart soften was one of the greatest blessings of my first year."
