One of the greatest joys this year has been the growth of our new Volunteer Ministries. Over 70 dedicated volunteers now dedicate two nights a month to serve regularly alongside our 50 missionaries in the evenings. They do street ministry, visit nursing homes, shelters, hospitals, and even jails, bringing Christ's presence to some of the most forgotten. These volunteers are doing more than just serving, they are loving, forming friendships, and weaving the ministry into their daily lives. Truly, your support has made it possible for this new branch of our mission to take root and flourish.

At the same time, we are prayerfully planning expansion into new cities. The call to bring Christ's love to the poor is spreading, and with your help, Christ in the City will continue to grow wherever the Holy Spirit leads.

Your prayers and your support make possible every smile on the street, every hand held in a hospital, every word of hope in a jail, and every friendship we form with the homeless. Because of you, Christ in the City remains a place where young adults encounter the poor, discover Christ's love in them, and learn how to share that love for the rest of their lives.

Reconciliation as Mission

At Christ in the City, the heart of our mission is not simply to serve - it's to reconcile.

Every encounter on the streets, every shared meal, every name remembered is part of something deeper: the healing of ruptured relationships and the restoration of communion with God and one another.

Many of our friends on the streets have experienced broken relationships with their families, their friends, and with God. In deep loneliness and experiencing the pain of being unseen, a quiet question is always present in their hearts:

"DO I MATTER?"

For them, overcoming homelessness without a positive answer to this question is, in many cases, an impossible goal. The deepest poverty isn't material; it's the absence of love and significance.

Our model is rooted in communion: with Jesus Christ, with each other, and with the poor. Formation gives our missionaries the interior freedom to love without fear, to remain even when it's hard, and to be living witnesses of a God who draws close.

Christ is the one who truly heals hearts wounded by rupture. We are ambassadors of reconciliation with him, sent to remind the forgotten of their infinite dignity.

MOLUMITEER/MINISTRIES

Christ in the City's mission goes beyond the streets. The poverty of loneliness and isolation exists in jails, nursing homes, hospitals, and homeless shelters. Since the founding of CITC, missionaries have visited such facilities in the evenings to continue spreading a culture of encounter.



Forming missionaries has always been the goal of CITC, and that applies to more than just the young adults who apply for a year of service. We strive to cultivate the missionary heart in volunteers, donors, and the greater Church by offering them meaningful opportunities to serve the poor. The "Volunteer Ministries" emerged as the ideal opportunity to get the greater community involved and cultivate more missionary hearts. These ministries offer the same opportunity for a relational-based ministry that Christ in the City provides for its full-time missionaries, but the ministries occur in settings and times that are more conducive for lay Christians who live ordinary lives.

With God's grace and the generosity of a large number of volunteers, we have built up these ministries and grown our volunteer base to sustain them. In a short time, the poor are being loved and encountered at a larger scale while more missionary hearts are being formed and sent out.

A new initiative has been founded and is taking shape: the Volunteer Ministries.


FORMING AND EQUIPPING THE CHURCH TO SERVE:

Additionally, we host a quarterly event called The Mission Series to bring volunteers and missionaries together and support them in their work.

"THANK YOU FOR LETTING ME () INTO YOUR HEARTS."—SON

We met Jon on our very first day as missionaries. Even in the earliest weeks of friendship, he taught us sign language, shared his oranges and coffee, and offered the little he had. And yet, beneath that generosity was deep suffering. On the streets, Jon faced intense physical pain, loneliness, and hopelessness. "I do not love myself," he once told us—words that reflected just how heavy his burden had become.

But through it all, we kept showing up. In his silence, we listened. In his despair, we stayed. After his unannounced and prolonged absence one week, we feared that he might not have survived the streets, so we prayed and checked hospitals—eventually discovering that he had been taken in by his former health aide. Jon began living in her basement, and with this stability, healing began.

He started to walk again—sometimes without crutches—hear more clearly, and smile more often. We brought him shells from the beach, prayer cards, photos, puzzles, and cake on his birthday. As he gradually opened to these gifts, it became clear: Jon was

learning he is worthy of love. Before Palm Sunday, he surprised us by asking to go to Mass. He got a palm, met Archbishop Pérez, and afterward insisted on us all celebrating with some Chinese food.

This friendship is still unfolding. Jon is now actively pursuing housing and told us that our presence has

helped him hope again. He dreams of building a wall in his future apartment filled with photos of the missionaries who have and will

walk with him.

We are grateful for the year we've shared and the second year ahead. Please pray for Jon—his journey toward housing, deeper family healing, and the continued joy of authentic friendship.
